# GFASG Plenary on Indigenous Food Systems and Sovereignty

Saturday, February 26th Begins at 11:20 AM EST AAG Virtual Room 39

This panel discussion, the plenary event for the Geographies of Food and Agriculture Specialty Group (GFASG), will address Indigenous food systems and sovereignty on Turtle Island. In particular, speakers will share their work and discuss how it intersects with multiple systems of power, place-based relationships, scholar-activist/activist-scholarship, and political economy.

Panel speakers include Latashia Redhouse from the Intertribal Agriculture Council and Suzanne Katsi'tsiarihshion Brant and Keith Williams from the First Nations Technical Institute. It will be moderated by the GFASG past chair Charles Levkoe, Canada Research Chair in Sustainable Food Systems at Lakehead University. This session will take a more informal conversational format with ample opportunity for attendee engagement. It is sponsored by the Journal of Agriculture, Food Systems, and Community Development.

#### Plenary speaker spotlight:

**Latashia Redhouse** is an enrolled member of the Diné Natio and the Intertribal Agriculture Council's American Indian Foods Program Director. Her passion is to inspire Indigenous professionals with marketing strategies and solutions to help grow their businesses.

Suzanne Katsi'tsiarihshion Brant is President & CEO of First Nations Technical Institute (FNTI). She provides leadership and innovation in Indigenous post-secondary education at FNTI. Suzanne holds a Master's degree from York University in Environmental Studies focusing on Indigenous post-secondary programming. She is an accomplished visual artist and photographer who has exhibited her work at the Woodland Cultural Centre, Brantford and Gallery 121, Belleville. She is a seasoned gardener and grower, specializing in Haudenosaunee traditional food systems and medicine plants. Suzanne has four incredible children and three beautiful granddaughters.

**Keith Williams** is the Director of Research and Social Innovation at FNTI. Keith is Mohawk and Dutch on his father's side. He is interested in better understanding how Indigenous ways of being and ways of knowing can help create a more equitable future for humanity and all our relations.

Charles Z. Levkoe is the Canada Research Chair in Equitable and Sustainable Food Systems, the Director of the Sustainable Food Systems Lab, and an Associate Professor in the Department of Health Sciences at Lakehead University. His community-engaged research uses a food systems lens to better understand the importance of and connections between social justice, ecological regeneration, regional economies, and active democratic engagement. # 2022 Geographies of Food and Agriculture Book Award


The GFASG's awards committee, consisting of Kristen Lowitt, Gwyneth Manser, Megan Dwyer Baumann, and Dana James, is thrilled to announce the winner and runner up for the 2022 Geographies of Food and Agriculture Book Award.

#### 2022 GFASG Book Award Winner

The winner of this year's award is Dr. Madeleine Fairbairn's *Fields of Gold*. Dr. Fairbairn is an Associate Professor in the Environmental Studies Department at the University of California, Santa Cruz. She studies the political economy of agriculture, including the financial sector's growing interest in buying farmland and, more recently, the Silicon Valley agri-food tech sector.

The awards committee shared the following reflection on Madeleine's work:

"Madeleine's book Fields of Gold makes a novel contribution to geographic studies of agricultural land. Additionally, Fairbairn speaks to a broad audience beyond agri-food geographies including finance and economics, critical political economy and other groups. Her clear writing makes accessible for readers a complex financing world around land and will not only reach academic audiences but those in policy, farming, and international governance more generally. We received two strong nomination letters for Fields of Gold, from Julie Guthman and David Mitchell, emphasizing the importance of Madeleine's methodology in studying not only the U.S. and Brazil, locations central to financing for land, but also the book's emphasis on 'studying up' by investigating elite investors and financing powers provides a view of land dynamics provided by few other scholars."

#### 2022 GFASG Book Award Runner Up

The awards committee is excited to acknowledge The \$16 Taco, by Dr. Pascale Joassart-Marcelli, as the runner up for this year's book award. Pascale Joassart-Marcelli is Professor of Geography and Director interdisciplinary Food Studies and Urban Studies programs at San Diego State University where she has been teaching courses such as Geography of Cities, Geography of Food, Food Justice, Feeding the World, and Food, Place, and Culture. Pascale's research focuses on the relationship between place, ethnicity, and food, including the role of food in creating just and sustainable cities for all with an emphasis on immigrant communities.

The awards committee shared the following reflection on Pascale's work:

"The \$16 Taco, by Pascale Joassart-Marcelli, is an engaging, strongly interdisciplinary contribution to debates of food studies, gentrification, cosmopolitanism and the linkages between race, ethnicity and place with food. Wellwritten and drawing from creative, mixed methods research conducted over six years in San Diego, the author's city of residence, the book would easily enter conversations at all levels of undergraduate and graduate studies around the cultural, social and racial aspects of food's role in urban change. Inventively, Joassart-Marcelli's deeply place-based contribution brings into conversation concepts of landscape, foodscape, food sovereignty, and displacement among others. The author's vibrant writing style helps to highlight the tensions inherent in urban gentrification in ways that are engaging and accessible to the reader."
